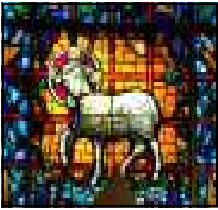

## “Planning Worship”

I hit a nerve, apparently, when I spoke in a recent sermon about a pastor friend who said he didn't use prayers of confession in his church because, "...all they do is make people feel bad." I replied, only half in jest, that we are Calvinists: we're *supposed* to feel bad. Those bad feelings lead to confession and that leads to forgiveness. "When I declared not my sin, my body wasted away through my groaning all day long.... I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to the Lord'; then thou dost forgive the guilt of my sin." (Psalm 32: 3-5). I was surprised how many people talked to me about that, and lamented the loss of confession in more contemporary, seeker-oriented styles of worship.

A so-called seeker service is designed to attract non-religious people. I have no quarrel with seeker services. There is more than one way to worship. I have been in seeker services that I thought were excellent, and I have been in traditional worship services that were as dead as a doornail. I do think, however, that worship planners striving to attract non-religious people have to be on guard against throwing the proverbial baby out with the bath water. Secular people don't like to feel bad about their failures, so you omit elements of penitence and confession. Without confession there is no need for an assurance of God's pardon, so out it goes. Secular people aren't interested in dusty old creeds and catechisms, so they are jettisoned. Seekers are interested in self-improvement, not suffering and discipleship, so sermons focus on self-realization and personal growth and "Five Ways to Boost Your Self-Esteem", all of which somehow begin with the letter C. You see where this is going.

When worship goes wrong, what makes it wrong is not upbeat music and guitars and drums. Actually, I think guitar music would be a pleasant addition to worship now and then. What makes worship wrong—whether seeker oriented or traditional—is when it revolves around *us*, rather than around a transcendent God, and when worship leaders become performers and the congregation becomes the audience. You're not the audience in worship—God is the audience.

I will look for you in your proper place on Sunday morning. "O come, let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord, our Maker!" (Psalm 95:6).

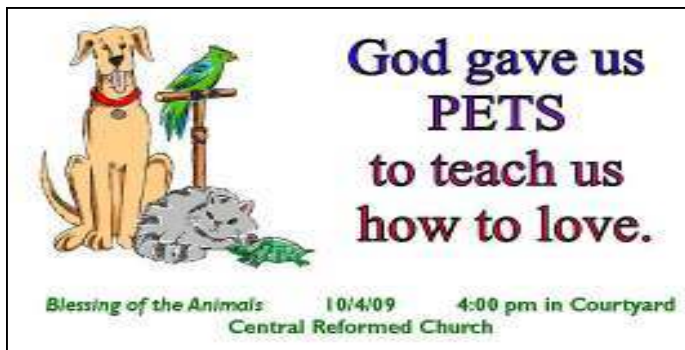

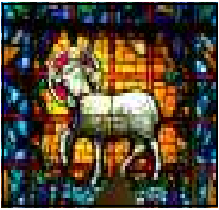

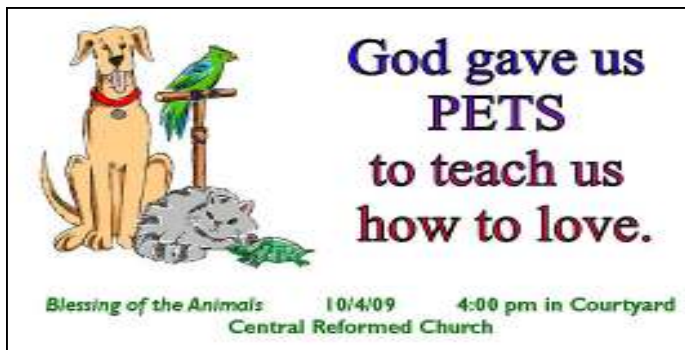
